Val was very, very concerned about the fact that she didn't want me doing anything over-strenuous. Even with walking, because I wanted to do that extra bit, rather than just walk what I was told to walk - because it was a very strict program. But I was trying to do a little bit more, and she was very concerned. And might I add, went back and told the nurses at the rehabilitation that I was doing so. So she was just like a little police woman for quite a while.

Avis - I found that when I got home, that they wanted to do things for me or, "Are you allowed to do that, mum?" or "Can we lift this?" I sort of decided that if another person said to me, "Are you allowed to do that mum?" I was going to punch them!
